Planning for Transitions

- The aim is to start preparation early as early as Year 7
- Use your Annual Reviews to discuss options
- We have support from agencies within the Local Authority such as Young Peoples Service.
- Use the Local Offer and the information in there. <u>Home | Live Well Cheshire West</u> (cheshirewestandchester.gov.uk)





Year 9 -

- Research local offer Live Well
- Transition map provides comprehensive options available
- Annual Reviews led by the Russett and here you can discuss your YPs aspirations.
 - Employment, Education etc
- Visit Colleges and Training Providers and go to College websites.





Year 10 -

- Continue to visit providers and use the Annual review to note options.
- Plans are maintained in Year 10 unless major changes are required
- Continue research and keep discussing with schools.



Year 11 –

- If young people are moving to Further Education (FE), Annual Reviews should take place in the Autumn Term. The Russett will organise the reviews.
- Final Plans need to be completed by 31st March. Last year we had over 97% completed in time.
- That is not the end, young people may and can change their mind, and so changes can happen in the summer term.





What is a Supported Internship?

An SI is a full-time 1-year study programme that includes tailored employability training alongside an extended unpaid work placement for young people 16-24 years with special educational needs (SEN) in receipt of an education, health and care plan (EHCP).





What is a Supported Internship?

- The aim for the programme is to give each learner the best opportunity of securing paid employment at the end of the programme.
- Cheshire West and Chester Council's Skills & Employment team launched its new Supported Internship programme in October 2020.
- Other providers such as Cheshire College,
 Pettypool, Reaseheath, Warrington Vale Royal and Wirral Met also deliver this programme.





Successes:

- Lots of Post 16 College Options
- Only LA provider directly delivering Supported Internships
- Positive links with the PCF
- The Post 16 Pathway Transition Map on Livewell
- Strong College Network sharing best practice across the LA area.

Learning Disability Definition

- A learning disability is a "significantly reduced ability to understand complex information or learn new skills; a reduced ability to cope independently; and a condition which started before adulthood with a lasting effect on development" (Valuing People, 2001). A learning disability, is not to be confused with a learning difficulty such as dyslexia and dyspraxia, it is a label given to a group of conditions that are present before the age of 18. These conditions impacts on the way individuals develop in core areas, how they live their lives and access healthcare.
- All 3 criteria below are needed to meet the definition of a learning disability:
- 1. Significantly reduced ability to understand new or complex information, to learn new skills (significantly impaired intelligence)
- 2. AND a reduced ability to cope independently (impaired social/adaptive functioning)
- **3. AND** the above started before adulthood (before 18) with a lasting effect on development.

Role of the GP.

 The GP is often a constant figure as young people transition between services. Young people with SEND with a learning disability should be included on the GP register of learning disability, where appropriate. This means they are automatically called for an annual health check from the age of 14.

0-25 SEND code of practice:a guide for health professionals

 Please speak to your GP if you feel your young person should be on this register





Annual Health Check for LD

- They must be:
- aged 14 and over
- on the practice learning disability health checks register
- Learning disability annual health checks are different from the wider NHS
 health check scheme. The learning disabilities health checks are designed to
 pick up a wider range of unmet health needs whereas the latter is intended to
 help individuals reduce their risk of heart disease, stroke, diabetes and kidney
 disease.
- Learning disabilities health checks can help people with learning disabilities to use health services better by understanding what their local GP service can provide for them and learning how to use it.
